Stamped Concrete Walkways

Concrete Engraving for Walkways With the use of special tools and equipment, patterns and designs can be permanently engraved into existing concrete. These patterns won't wear away since they have been carved into the concrete rather than applied to the top of it. Exposed Aggregate Finishes for Walkways

Sandblasting and water pressure are one of the few ways to expose the coarse rocks in the concrete mix. For more information, visit the following link:

Colored Concrete for Walkways

Intricately Sawed or Grooved Patterns for Walkways

Concrete Stains for Walkways

Chemical stains are applied to existing concrete surfaces and penetrate the surface to produce uneven, mottled, and variegated color effects depending on the stain's reaction with the concrete's minerals. Stains can also be applied to concrete that has already been integrally colored and inside the routed-out designs in stamped and engraved patterns. Concrete Engraving for Walkways

Concrete engraving is often done on existing walkways to produce a look like elaborate brickwork at a fraction of the cost. So a plain gray walkway can be poured, then stained and engraved to look like brick. For more information, visit the following link:

Concrete Overlays for Walkways

Concrete can be resurfaced and look just like a stamped concrete or travertine finished surface. The new surface is only 1/8- to ½-inch thick. The concrete is cleaned, acid etched and neutralized, then a primer coat is rolled on the walkway surface. Finally, the colored polymer is applied and stamped or jointed, and the concrete sealed. Sawcut Patterns for Walkways

Different square or rectangular patterns can be sawcut into an existing walkway and are often combined with concrete staining. Square patterns are used for borders and diagonal patterns are used for the interior area. For more information, visit the following link:

Random Cut Patterns for Walkways

Permanent patterns can be sawed into the concrete's surface by using a concrete saw or hand tool. For added effects, colors can be used in the "fields" of the pattern. For more information, visit the following link:
